

How to Request an Evaluation of Coursework

Steps:

- 1. Enroll at Santa Barbara City College (SBCC).
- Verify your major/program/educational goal is correct. Follow the steps on Degree Works™ to update your information.
- Submit official transcripts to SBCC from all past institutions you have attended.
 - AP Scores: see Step 5.
- 4. Verify your official transcripts were received by SBCC Admissions and Records. If your official transcripts are not on file your request for evaluation will not be processed.
- 5. Submit a request for evaluation:
 - Prerequisite and corequisite clearance requests: Follow the instructions on the Prerequisite Instructions & Forms page.
 - AP score requests: Follow the instructions on the Advanced Placement (AP) Test Scores page to submit your Score Report.
 - Evaluation of California Community College transcripts: Use the TAPPER online form to request an evaluation.
 - Evaluation of transcripts from other institutions such as UC, CSU, private, out of state, or international: Contact an Academic Counselor for assistance.

After you submit a request for evaluation:

See the FAQ page for processing information and timelines. Notifications will be emailed to your SBCC Pipeline account, so check it regularly.

4. Students need to read the instructions and submit FORM A or FORM B based on reason for requesting a Prerequisite Clearance.

Prerequisite Instructions & Forms

Prerequisite Clearance Form A: his form is used for verification of prerequisites/corequisites based on successful completion of equivalent/substitute coursework from regionally accredited colleges and universities, or high schools. Examples of coursework include: college and university courses, high school courses (chemistry, physics, and foreign language courses only). College-level coursework must be completed with a grade of C, Pass or Credit (where Pass and Credit are a C/2.0 or above).

AP Scores: Visit the AP Test Scores page for instructions.

Prerequisite Clearance Form B: his form is used for verification of prerequisite and/or corequisite(s) based on grounds other than coursework, such as work experience, native language, licenses or certificates, etc.

2 Steps to complete a prerequisite clearance form:

- 1. Gather your support documents:
 - Form A: OFFICIAL transcripts
 - Follow the instructions on Incoming Transcripts to submit your transcripts to SBCC Admissions and Records and verify your transcripts have been received.
 - Official transcripts must be verified as received by Admissions and Records BEFORE you submit Form A or your request will not be processed.
 - Do not submit transcripts to the Transcript Evaluation Office. They will not be considered official, and will not be reviewed or processed.
 - Official transcripts must show proof you have completed the prerequisite/corequisite or your request will be denied.
 - Form B: Reasoning/support documents
 - If you are using a license, certification, etc. as justification for your request you must submit a copy of the document(s).
- 2. Complete and submit your prerequisite clearance request form (log in with your SBCC Pipeline username and password):
 - Prerequisite Clearance Form A
 - Need help? How to fill out Form A
 - 2 Prerequisite Clearance Form B
 - . Need help? How to fill out Form B
- 5. Student needs to gather their supporting documents and then submit FORM A or FORM B ONLINE.

What should students do after submitting the prerequisite clearance request (more information is available online):

After you submit a prerequisite clearance request:

Requests are generally processed within ten (10) business days of receipt of your completed form and all required documentation. This time frame excludes weekends, holidays, and campus closures and is subject to change without notification. Important Notes:

- Notifications and decisions are emailed to students at their SBCC Pipeline account.
- Students are not permitted to enroll in courses that require prerequisites or corequisites until their request is approved.
- An approved petition does not guarantee space in any course.
- An add code from an instructor does not override a prerequisite clearance request.



AB 540 California Nonresident Tuition Exemption

GENERAL INFORMATION

Any student, other than one with United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) **nonimmigrant** visa status (see exception below for students who have been granted T or U visa status), who meets all of the following requirements, shall be exempt from paying nonresident tuition at the California Community Colleges, the University of California, and the California State University (all public colleges and universities in California).¹

- A student is exempt from paying nonresident tuition if the student meets *all* of the following four requirements:
 - 1. The student must have:
 - attended a combination of California high school, adult school, and California Community College for the equivalent of three years or more,² or
 - attained credits earned in California from a California high school equivalent to three or more years of full-time high school course work and attended a combination of elementary, middle and/or high schools in California for a total of three or more years,³ and
 - 2. The student must have:
 - graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent prior to the start of the term (for example, passing the GED or California High School Proficiency exam), or
 - completed an associate degree from a California Community College, or
 - completed the minimum requirements at a California Community College for transfer to the California State University or the University of California, and
 - 3. The student must register as an entering student at, or current enrollment at, an accredited institution of higher education in California, and
 - 4. The student must file an affidavit with the college or university stating that if the student is a non-citizen without current or valid immigration status, the student has filed an application to legalize immigration status, or will file an application as soon as the student is eligible to do so.
- Students who are nonimmigrants who are victims of trafficking, domestic violence, and other serious crimes who have been granted T or U visa status, under Title 8 of the United States Code, sections 1101(a)(15)(T) or (U) are eligible for this exemption.⁴
- Students who are nonimmigrants, other than those with T or U visa status as noted above, [for example, those who hold F (student) visas, B (visitor) visas, etc.] are not eligible for this exemption.
- A year's equivalence at a California Community College is a minimum of 24 semester units of credit or 36 quarter units of credit. For noncredit courses, a year's attendance is a minimum of 420 hours, 210 hours for a semester, and 140 hours a quarter.

¹ This exemption to the requirement to pay the nonresident tuition fee is often referred to "AB 540" after the Assembly Bill which enacted the exemption. (Ed. Code, § 68130.5.)

² In 2018, Senate Bill 68 was enacted to further expand the AB 540 exemption to allow adult school and noncredit course work to establish eligibility.

³ In 2014, Assembly Bill 2000 was enacted amending Education Code section 68130.5 to allow this additional flexibility in meeting the requirements for the exemption.

⁴ In 2012, Assembly Bill 1899 was enacted into law exempting holders of T and U visas from paying nonresident tuition. (Ed. Code, § 68122.)

- The accumulation of credit and/or non-credit in any academic year shall be calculated in reference to a year's equivalence. Partial completion in an academic year is allowed. (Example: 12 units of credit courses in an academic year is equal to a semester for purposes of determining eligibility.)
- Attendance in credit courses at a California Community College towards the attendance requirements shall not exceed two years of full-time attendance.
- The student must file an exemption request including a signed affidavit with the college that
 indicates the student has met all applicable conditions described above. Student information
 obtained in this process is strictly confidential unless disclosure is required under law.
- Students eligible for this exemption who are transferring to another California public college or university must submit a new request (and documentation if required) to each college under consideration.
- Nonresident students meeting the criteria will be exempted from the payment of nonresident tuition, but they will not be classified as California residents. They continue to be "nonresidents".
- The California Dream Act extends Cal Grant A and B Entitlement awards, Cal Grant C awards, the California Promise Grant (formerly known as the BOG fee waiver), Chaffee grants, and institutional financial aid to students that meet these criteria as well as the applicable criteria for eligibility for specific types of financial aid.
- AB540 does not provide federal student financial aid eligibility for undocumented students. These students remain ineligible for federal financial aid.

PROCEDURES FOR REQUESTING THIS EXEMPTION FROM NONRESIDENT TUITION

California Community Colleges: Complete the form entitled California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Request. Submit it to the Admissions Office at the community college where you are enrolled or intend to enroll. You may be required to submit additional documentation. Call the college Admissions Office if you have questions.

University of California: The University of California (UC) campuses each have their own nonresident tuition exemption application and affidavit forms. Requests are not to be submitted until you have been admitted to a UC campus and have filed both a Statement of Intent to Register and also a Statement of Legal Residence. California State University: Complete the form on California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Request. Contact the Office of Admission and Records at the CSU campus where you are enrolled or intend to enroll for instructions on submission, deadline information, and additional requirements. You will be required to submit final high school transcripts and appropriate records of high school graduation or the equivalent, if you have not done so already. Important California College Promise Grant (CCPG) Program Update

In an effort to help students succeed in the California community colleges, the Student Success Act of 2012 (California Senate Bill 1456) was signed into law by Governor Brown. Among other aspects, the Act included the creation of minimum academic and progress standards that must be met for continued eligibility for the California College Promise Grant (CCPG). These are different and separate standards from those for student federal aid, Cal Grant, and enrollment priority.

The Academic and Progress Standards for the CCPG are:

Academic Standards: Cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher.

Progress Standards: Cumulative satisfactory completion of more than 50% of all coursework attempted.

- These standards do not apply to foster youth (24 years and younger).
- Eligibility to receive support services is not affected.
- Exemption is extended to enrollment priority.
- The 100 total degree-applicable completed unit cap does not apply to the CCPG.

In order for students to maintain CCPG eligibility, they must meet both the Academic and Progress Standards listed above.

In the future, within 30 days of the end of a primary term (Fall or Spring), the College will send a communication to those students who failed to meet the standards for two consecutive primary terms and will include instructions for how to appeal the loss of the CCPG. This appeal is separate from any appeal for federal student aid, and the approval of one appeal will not mean the automatic approval of the other.

Appeals

Students will be able to appeal the loss of the California College Promise Grant based upon the following verifiable circumstances:


- Extenuating circumstances cases of accidents, illnesses, or other circumstances beyond a student's control.
- A change in a student's economic situation.
- Evidence that a student was unable to obtain essential support services.
- Special consideration of factors for CalWORKs, EOPS, DSPS, and veteran students.
- Students with disabilities who applied for but did not receive accommodation in a timely manner.
- Significant academic improvement.
- Successful appeal for enrollment priority extends to the fee waiver.

Measurement of these standards will begin with fall 2015. The first semester a student could lose CCPG eligibility as a result of not meeting these standards was fall 2016. Students who do not meet the standards will receive notifications within 30 days of the end of each term.



Transfer Notes

- UCSB TAG requires 30 units by end of summer and 60 units by end of spring (max 10.66 semester units AP/IB/A-level). No more than 18 in spring toward the 60. (2.0 min GPA fall/spring NO Ds or Fs in spring prior to transfer).
- You may be at SBCC 2 or 3 years depending on your major, and how many units you take each semester.
- O Your AP/IB credit counts above and beyond the 70 units max from a California Community College.

• The alternate major must have been listed on the original UC Application submitted in November. Requests to add or change the alternate major after submission of the application will not be considered. This applies to all alternate majors at UCLA. Note: The TAP policy on review of alternate majors is still restricted to those in the UCLA College (Letters and Science). Majors in the Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science (HSSEAS), the School of Arts and Architecture (SOAA), the School of Nursing, and the School of Theater, Film and Television (TFT) are NOT acceptable for alternate major review.

What does UCLA Undergraduate Admissions look at when reviewing applications for admission?

- Completion of major preparation courses, strength of overall GPA, and strength of major prep GPA
- What minimum requirements must be completed by the end of spring term? 60 semester/90 quarter transferable units, Major preparation minimum requirements, UC English composition requirement, mathematics requirement and transfer course pattern for UC minimum eligibility. By the end of summer term, completion of IGETC coursework and any additional recommended requirements for major preparation will ensure students are ready to begin full coursework at UCLA.
- Some majors are highly selective. For these majors UCLA looks for stronger preparation: most preparatory courses completed before transferring and a significant number of courses completed at the time of application. Must show significant interest in the major by show of classes taken. Biochemistry, Business Economics; Economics; Economics/International Area Studies, Life Sciences majors Biology; Ecology, Behavior, and Evolution; Marine Biology; Microbiology, Immunology, and Molecular Genetics; Molecular, Cell, and Developmental Biology; Neuroscience; Physiological Science; Psychobiology, Communication Studies, English, Global Studies, History, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology.
- o Is there a minimum GPA which guarantees admission? No.
- o Is IGETC required for admission? No, but it is strongly recommended.
- What is more important to complete major prep or IGETC? Although students are encouraged to complete both, major preparation is the most important. If students in high unit majors enter without IGETC, they will have substantial GE to complete after they enter much more than if they had completed IGETC and major preparation at the community college. This will increase their time to degree.
- The SBCC Honors Certificate of Achievement is a state approved program of study. To earn the Honors Certificate of Achievement you must have a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in honors courses and a minimum grade of B in each honors course (a maximum of one honors course may be completed with a 'C' grade). For the Honors: Humanities/Social Sciences Certificate you must complete six honors, not including HNRS 100, (16.5-24 units). For the Honors: Sciences/Mathematics Certificate you must complete a minimum of four honors courses, not including HNRS 100, (10.5-16 units), and four specified Science/Math courses (12-20.5 units). You must submit a certificate application, and upon completion of the program your SBCC transcript will have the designation of Honors Certificate of Achievement. You will also earn a parchment quality certificate for the SBCC Certificate of Achievement of the Honors Program (Highest Honors with 3.5 GPA in all course work completed at SBCC).
- You are able to take any honors courses once you have been admitted to the program; you are not required to earn the certificate.

SANTA BARBARA CITY COLLEGE HONORS PROGRAM

What is the SBCC Honors Program?

The Santa Barbara City College Honor's Program better prepares the highly motivated student to transfer to a university and complete a bachelor's degree than non-Honors courses by contributing breadth to students' majors in both humanities and sciences and by showing connections and interrelationships between disciplines. These courses are developed to meet the needs of students whose academic goals and interests are not satisfied by regular courses. Students who enroll in the Honors curriculum will gain the opportunity to become independent learners, to participate actively in the shaping of their education and to exercise their talents at their highest levels of excellence. The Honors Program provides a unique learning environment which stresses scholastic excellence and develops the academic awareness necessary to achieve this goal by enhancing writing, reading, and study skills. (Honors Website: www.sbcc.edu/honors)

Why should I consider the Honors Program?

The Honors program provides close academic and social interaction with other highly motivated students. Honors classes are smaller than non-Honors courses and are taught by outstanding faculty who support students' educational endeavors. Students have the opportunity to participate in the SBCC Honor's Guild, a student-run organization for Honors Students interested in enhancing their college experience. Some universities have an honors transfer agreement giving preferential consideration to SBCC students who have completed the honors program. All honors courses taken are designated on the transcript.

Are scholarships Available?

Santa Barbara County high school students who are accepted in a fall semester to the program directly from high school with a GPA of at least 3.75 are automatically considered for a \$1,000 scholarship.

How do I know if I am eligible?

To be eligible for the honors program you must have a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA from high school with no grade lower than a "C" in any academic subject. Continuing, returning and transfer students who have completed 12 units or more must have a 3.0 cumulative college GPA, with no grade below a "C" in an academic subject. Students must be eligible for or have completed English 110 and at least Math 107. English and Mathematics placement examinations are part of the SBCC enrollment procedure. Mathematics eligibility for the program may also be met with three years of high school math, including two years of algebra, with grades of "C" or better. AP or IB test may also be used for placement; contact the Assessment Center.

How do I apply?

Applications for the Honors Program and a list of courses offered may be obtained from the Welcome Center in the Student Services Building or online at: sbcc.edu/honors. Official high school or college transcripts must be submitted with the applications. (Continuing students do NOT need to provide an SBCC transcript). Applications will not be accepted unless they are complete. The application, transcripts, AP/IB scores, if necessary, and writing sample must be submitted to the Director. Once admitted, students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA and complete Honors 100 - Colloquium to continue in the program. (Conditional admission to the honors program may be granted at the discretion of the Director).

How do I earn the Honors Certificate?

The Honors Certificate of Achievement is a state approved program of study. To earn the Honors Certificate of Achievement you must have a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in honors courses and a minimum grade of B in each honors course (a maximum of one honors course may be completed with a 'C' grade). For the Honors: Humanities/Social Sciences Certificate you must complete six honors, not including HNRS 100, (16.5-24 units). For the Honors: Sciences/Mathematics Certificate you must complete a minimum of four honors courses, not including HNRS 100, (10.5-16 units), and four specified Science/Math courses (12-20.5 units). You must submit a certificate application, and upon completion of the program your SBCC transcript will have the designation of *Completed Honors Program*. You will also earn a parchment quality certificate for the SBCC Certificate of Achievement of the Honors Program (Highest Honors with 3.5 GPA in all course work completed at SBCC). Upon petition and subject to verification, up to two honors courses may be accepted from another accredited college.

Are there Transfer Agreements with Universities for the Honors Program?

UCLA and UCI offer priority admission consideration for students who complete the honors certificate at SBCC. For UCLA that priority is limited to all majors (except Communication) in the College of Letters and Science. If a student completes the honors certificate at SBCC and is admitted to UCLA, s/he can then apply for admission to UCLA's College Honors and will be admitted. If students fall short of the selection criteria for UCSC, completion of our honors certificate may allow them to be considered for admission as an exception. SBCC is a member of the Honors Transfer Council of California www.honorstcc.org which has agreements with CSU Fullerton, Stanislaus, SDSU, San Jose State (Engineering), Azusa Pacific, Chapman, La Sierra University, Loyola Marymount University, Mills College, Occidental College, Pitzer College, Pomona College, University of

San Diego and Whitman College. Some agreements are for priority consideration to the University, others are agreements from our Honors Program to theirs.



With 44 years of experience, the Santa Barbara City College Study Abroad Department has sent over 6,000 students all over the world.

On our summer programs, any graduate from an accredited high school and any other person who can reasonably profit from instruction is eligible to apply. A student does not need to be enrolled at SBCC in order to apply for our Study Abroad Programs. Participants must be 18 years or older by the departure date.

Semester program applicants must have successfully completed a minimum of 12 College-level units with a GPA of 2.5 or higher by the end of the semester prior to studying abroad. In addition, program applicants must have successfully completed English 110. Students do not have to be declared majors in the field they will be studying abroad and there is no language prerequisite. Participants must be 18 years or older on the departure date.

Students can apply for many scholarships to fund the trip. Financial Aid and the California College Promise can be used towards these programs.

Usually all of the courses offered on our Study Abroad programs are UC/CSU transferable. Please check with your academic counselor for possible exceptions.

For students who currently attend a Study Abroad Consortium member school, your home school must give credit for courses taken on a SBCC Study Abroad program on the same basis as if it provided the training itself.


