Santa Barbara City College is a diverse campus community. Hispanic/Latinx, Black, Asian/Pacific Islander, and Native American students represent 54% of our student body. The success of all students is a priority. However, a large portion of our transfer to a CSU or UC. Many of our students are the first generation in the family to attend college and most have significant financial needs. Our students, however, come to us eager to learn and to make better lives for themselves and their families.

Participants will learn practical strategies and tools for the classroom and service areas as well as gain knowledge and understanding of the available resources that will equip faculty and staff to more effectively serve and lead on behalf of our diverse community of students and staff. Classes are not for credit. However, flex credit may be available for faculty (subject to approval from FPD).

Build Your Skills and Qualifications

All employees may take **qualified** courses; attend workshops, or participate in special events sponsored by the College in pursuit of the Achievement Award or take individual courses certified as eligible by the Equal Employment Opportunity Advisory Committee (EEOAC). The Achievement Award is attained by the completion of two to six courses or workshops in each of the seven core topic areas. The Program is intended to be completed over a period of time.



How does this Program work?

You can complete individual modules (digital badges) for each of the seven core topic areas listed above and over time complete all seven modules to earn the Success Through Equity Achievement Award. Each module has a different completion requirement as listed in the table:
